# RM500,000 raised through golf tourney

## Donations include two mobile disaster relief units

**A**BOUT RM500,000 will be channelled to various charitable organisations after the Lions Club of Subang Jaya raised the amount through its 15th Charity Golf Tournament recently.

Donations also included two mobile disaster relief units sponsored by medical equipment company Stryker Corporation (M) Sdn Bhd and RM100,000 by Chevron Malaysia Ltd.

One of the units would be donated to the Women, Family and Community Development Ministry, said the club's president Tony Siew at the tournament dinner held at the Tropicana

Golf and Country Resort.

"The Malaysian AIDS Foundation will also be receiving RM20,000, while RM50,000 will go to the FC Yap Scholarship Fund," he said.

"We are happy that we were not only able to play golf and socialise but also give something back to the society at the same time," Siew added.

The remaining sum would be divided among other charities to be decided by the club soon.

Also present at the event were the ministry's National Population and Family Development Board (LPPKN) director-general Datuk Aminah

Abdul Rahman and Chevron Malaysia Limited retail and commercial and industrial general manager Jeremy Oh Beng Chuan.

Malaysian AIDS Foundation chairman Prof Dr Adeeba Kamarulzaman said the contribution was a positive start to the new year.

"I was expecting that charity would not come by so easy as we are now facing the global economic crisis. This was a nice surprise," she said.

Dr Adeeba said the funds would be used to provide financial assistance to needy HIV positive patients seeking treatment.
